

Building Happenings

It is time to bring you all up to date on our three-part upgrade project of the PSS 1747 Nellis Tavern properties. They include the Tavern building, the little Red Building, and School #8 located on the New Turnpike.

Back in 2018, the trustees began discussing refurbishing all three buildings. The Tavern had water-damaged siding and other damage, the Red Building had multiple problems, and the school had been closed since 1945. In 2019 we began getting estimates for the Tavern project. The original estimate was about \$30,000.

The Elwood Construction Co. was hired to do the Tavern work over a four-year period. Unfortunately, problems behind the clapboards needed attention, so by the end of 2020 they were not quite finished with the north side. In 2021 the Elwood's completed that side and gutters were added. The work included window work and priming and painting after the construction work had been done. The total for the north side came to \$27,000. The east side was finished for \$7,000 as there was much less damage there.

The south side was the work for 2022 and included work on the porch and rebuilding the stairway as well as siding and window reconstruction and of course the painting. Here the job was three-story height and required a power lift part of the time. The total was \$28,000.

Early on, back in 2019, we decided to ask other local carpenters to work on both the Red Building and the school. The work was necessary but simpler. In 2020, an Amish family repaired the outside of the Red Building, repaired or rebuilt several windows, built a new door, and repainted the outside of the building. Our cost was \$2300.00.

The school is a similar story. For at least 100 years it had been covered with brown wooden shakes. In 2021 John Case discovered that behind the shakes were good white clapboards. The shakes came off and the clapboards were repaired and painted white with green trim as they had been originally. The windows were repaired, and new shutters were built for protection. A porch was replaced. In 2022 the interior was cleaned and painted, an old ceiling was removed, one slate blackboard was replaced, and a bulletin board repaired. Battery-powered electric lights now use the original electrical system throughout. Desks donated from several sources are now in place. This project's cost was \$8,500.00.

We started three projects, completed two, and have one ¾ finished. Most of this work was done during the Covid Pandemic, so the PSS had to forgo several good fundraising activities. And now, the west side project, about to commence, may be nearly as expensive to repair as the north side.

A new problem that we discovered this past fall is that a portion of the foundation beneath the kitchen has seriously deteriorated and needs a major overhaul to the tune of about \$12,000. We have contracted for that new job and have applied for a grant to pay for part, hopefully most, of that cost. If we fail to get the grant, the west side project will have to be completed over several years.

Our financial situation needs some assistance. We are reinstating the Antique Show this March and the Rhubarb Festival will continue in June. That and a couple of other events should help. Membership renewals will be really welcomed this year, especially if folks have not done that in recent years. Donations in any amount will make a huge difference.

District #8 School - 2022

Having worked several years restoring the building and grounds of the schoolhouse on New Turnpike, we proceeded to the classroom. First, we removed the fiberboard ceiling that had been covering the original wainscot. After repairing several holes in the walls, we painted the entire interior, matching the original color. The existing built-in bookcase in the northwest corner was cleaned, repaired and painted. The books in it were cleaned and/or replaced.

We installed shades in all the windows and repaired the bulletin board. We repaired the existing wiring to accommodate 12-volt LED lights. This was done to provide light without the expense of rewiring the building and installing a new electric entrance.

The remainder of the year we cleaned the floor and the remaining donated desks. We worked on re-supplying the school like it would have been prior to its closing in 1945.

Many members of the Palatine Settlement Society and others donated time and materials to refurbish the school. Sally Nellis Kuehl gave us a very generous financial donation which gave us incentive to complete our project.

Our challenge for the future is to encourage the public to become involved in the history of School #8. We welcome visitors and ideas.

Donna Reston, 1938-2022

On December 21, 2022, the Palatine Settlement Society (Nellis Tavern and School #8)—and indeed the whole Mohawk Valley—lost one of its most ardent and enthusiastic supporters of history and material culture. The Society's trustee emeritus, Donna Reston, passed away from a brain injury resulting from a fall. Donna, 84, had been recovering from a stroke. Born in Amsterdam, NY, Donna was a lifelong resident of the city, graduating from Amsterdam High School and receiving Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts degrees in History and Social Studies from SUNY Albany.

Donna taught high school History from 1960 to 1980, when she left the Fonda-Fultonville faculty to become a full-time dealer in antiques and folk art. Passionate about Mohawk Valley history and the preservation of local heritage, Donna spent several decades as a board member of the Palatine Settlement Society, contributing her expertise to the restoration efforts at Nellis Tavern, and she acquired antiques and artifacts to help furnish the Tavern's rooms. For a time, she served on the board of the Montgomery County Historical Society (Old Fort Johnson), and she supported the decorative arts and art collections at the New York State Museum in Albany through loans, sales, and gifts. Her interest in folk art extended to regional artists Fritz Vogt and Claude Mann, as well as the numerous anonymous early artists and craftspeople who chronicled the history and people of the Mohawk Valley.

Donna's knowledge of Historical artifacts, her committed support of local history, her assertive personality, and her hearty laugh will be remembered and will be missed.
